

Frequently Asked Questions

Drama & Theatre Studies

Question: What are some of the key topics I would cover?

Answer: Students will look at the thematic of heroes/villains in relation to Total Theatre and Renaissance Theatre. They will also analyse 'live' performances they have seen.

Students will study the Theatre of Catastrophe and rehearse a script for performance. Part of the assessment will be a portfolio of rehearsal notes

Question: How many other subjects can I choose alongside this one?

Answer: For the majority of students, the expectation is that you will do the equivalent of three full time courses, of which Drama would be one.

Question: What is the learning style like within this subject?

Answer: The course demands practical, creative and communication skills in almost equal measure. You will extend your ability to create drama and theatre, either in a performing OR production role. The majority of your lessons will be practical in nature, but there will also be some formal lectures.

Question: How will I be assessed?

Answer: With all linear Alevels your real assessments do not occur until your second year. However, throughout both years there will be an even split between performances, coursework and written exams.

Question: What support can I access if I am struggling?

Answer: You can access 1 to 1 support at any time within the course. Staff can be contacted via email at all times, in order to arrange additional help.

Question: Are there any subject specific entry requirements?

Answer: A Grade 4 in English Language. No prior experience of Drama is required.

Question: Are there normally any trips that I can go on?



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Answer: In a normal year we would have various trips to see live theatre, including a two-day residential in London. We also have the capacity to stream live performances if students are unable to go on the trips.

Question: What do students who have studied this area normally do after Collyer's?

Answer: Drama is one of the few subjects that gives your interpersonal skills that cover a vast range of careers. That said, we have ex-students working professional within the arts; as Directors, Technicians, Playwrights, Performers, etc.

Expectations of a Drama Student – Proactive Study

Work you set yourself

- You will organise rehearsals outside of lessons
- You will run bespoke 'warm-ups' within lessons
- ¥ You will annotate scripts
- You will prepare audition speeches
- You embed key words into your written work
- You will learn lines promptly
- You will add to your portfolio weekly
- You regularly consider the impact on the audience
- You will make notes in lesson but also file and organise them at home
- You will regularly visit the theatre and read play-scripts in your own time
- You will analyse award-winning actors how they perform but also their career path
- You will attempts physical and vocal challenges outside your comfort zone (e.g. use of accents, song, physical theatre)
- You will meet all deadlines practical and written
- You will ask for '1 to 1' support the moment you need it
- You will treat all staff and students with a professional respect
