What type of job are you looking for?

If you're unsure of the type of employment you're looking for, the best starting point is to take an employability personality test.


- <u>Unifrog</u> gives you access to a Personality Profile quiz. Once you've taken the short quiz, it will tell you what your employment personality is like, which types of jobs you are suited to and then detailed information regarding how to progress into specific career pathways.
- <u>Fast Tomato</u> does a similar job. Sgn up using the Collyer's registration code QAHL (capital letters).
 Your year group is 12/13. The 'virtual' careers advisor will ask you a range of questions before it generates a personalised list of possible careers directions for you. From there, you can then research specific jobs and progression routes.





Jobs for the future

When you're looking for careers options, it's important that you find out as much as you can about the industry that you'd like to work in, as well as how sustainable that career is likely to be in the future.

For example, did you know:

- One in five jobs coming up in the next five years are predicted to be in engineering industries?
 (Source: <u>Engineering UK</u>)
- Your salary is likely to be £10,000 a year more as a nutritionist than as a sports coach? (Source: Moving On Magazine)

Information like this can be found in Labour Market Information (LMI). A good website to research LMI is <u>SuccessatSchool.org</u>. Knowing how much you'll be paid; how competitive the job market is and where most jobs are based can influence your decision in pursuing a career.

So be prepared and do some research!



Applications - Top Tips

- Research thoroughly using all sources recommended in this presentation and on the Employment Information & Guidance document.
- Take your time to consider what's available and how far you are prepared to travel.
- Prioritise the jobs you're interested in but keep an open mind on others you see.
- Create a timeline of individual deadlines and make sure you meet these (some employers will close applications as soon as they have sufficient to select from).
- Prepare for each step of the process applications, assessments, ability tests & interview. Your
 preparation needs to be as thorough as your exam prep!

CVs and application letters

- Unifrog has a 'CV tool' essential as a starting point!
- It helps you build the evidence you need in sections: contact details, personal introduction, your skills, work experience, education & qualifications, interests and references.
- It's important to remember that you will need to adapt your CV for different applications to ensure you cover the skills, qualities and competencies each employer is looking for.
- It's not uncommon to have multiple versions of your CV on the go at any one time!



Drafting application materials

Interviews - Preparation is the key to success!

- Plan your journey and arrive early
- Dress smartly
- Research the company and job role thoroughly
- Know how your skills and experiences fit the job description
- Practice answering questions beforehand
- Compile a list of your own questions to ask at interview.
- Switch off your mobile phone!
- Set a good first impression be confident, clear and focused in your answers
- Ask for clarification if you don't understand a question
- Be the best version of YOURSELF!

Gap Year Jobs

If you're thinking of taking a gap year job, a great starting point for your research will be the Collyer's Careers SharePoint, <u>Gap Year section</u>.

It's important that you consider the pros and cons of a gap year. Prospects website identifies some important considerations, such as: when to take a gap year, financial implications, benefits in the short and long term, current Government advice on travel and COVID-19 updates.

Some students use a gap year to gain professional development by working in industry for a year. This type of opportunity can strongly support UCAS or Apprenticeship applications for the following year. YINI (Year IN Industry) has links to current programmes and tips on the process of applying.
