## **Partnerships**


In my last newsletter I explained how important partnership work is for Collyer's and two of the various networks we are members of. Working ever closer with our local partner schools, we were delighted to take part in the first ever joint INSET day on Friday 31<sup>st</sup> March for teachers from Millais, Forest, Tanbridge, Bohunt, The Weald and Collyer's. It was a really uplifting and thought-provoking event and a great chance for colleagues to network and share good practice for the benefit of young people in Horsham and beyond.



Further from home, Collyer's took part in the inaugural Mercers' Leadership Conference held at St. Paul's School on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> February. This new annual event will allow members of our senior management team to learn from counterparts from across the country and different educational sectors. And finally, we are in the last planning stages of another inaugural event – the Mercers' Year 12 Conference. Aimed at students and hosted at Reading University, the day is focused on 'Sustainable Futures' and will be opened by a keynote from Lord Professor Robert Winston and include workshops led by university academics.

## **Property strategy**

Now that the scaffolding around the Shelley Building has been removed and the hoarding taken away, our community have been able to see much more clearly the daily progress with completing our much-anticipated new classroom block. We intend for prospective students and parents to be able to tour the new facility as part of our Open Evening on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> July and will have a formal opening event as well in due course. A thoroughly modern building, with a light, airy design and state-of-the-art heating and cooling using air source heat pumps and solar panels – this will be a fantastic addition to our teaching space. A large glazed foyer is planned to double as an art gallery to showcase student work.



The Shelley Building, the new Café and the new perimeter fence mark completion now of Stage 1 of our estates masterplan. Stage 2 involves further expansion to be able to accommodate a student intake that grows each year as well as ensuring our facilities continue to keep pace with the quality of education on offer. This growth aligns with the original intent of our founder Richard Collyer who asked in his will for 'none to be refused likely to learn'. Four projects are now moving forwards to the design and planning phase: a larger Sports Centre, a new Tech Centre, an expanded Library and an extended Arts Quarter.



Funding for our estates masterplan will of course be critical for its delivery, and as part of our overall strategy we have just launched the Quincentenary Fund, a fundraising project that gives the opportunity to our Old Collyerians, local stakeholders and also our current and prospective community to support the future development of the college if they wish. The OCA Centenary Dinner took place on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> March in our new Café – a wonderful event that brought together Old Collyerians from across the generations to celebrate a significant milestone in their history. Our alumni organisation continues from strength to strength, having nearly doubled its membership last year, and we fully expect an influx of new 2A members at Founder's Day on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> May which could triple numbers as the OCA heads into their next centenary. Work is under way already to develop an enhanced offer of events and benefits for newer members, particularly those studying at university or forging their new careers. ### **Sustainability**

In my last newsletter I explained that Collyer's is actively looking to reduce the carbon footprint of its estate. Our Estates Committee has agreed a plan to replace a significant amount of our old fashioned lighting with newer LED technology which uses less power. This is a significant piece of work that will take place over the summer holidays. At the same time, since we have plans for major building work in the coming years, we are exploring the feasibility of installing geothermal energy technology as one possible option for heating our future buildings. Our Sustainability Committee comprising students and staff will be monitoring progress with both initiatives as part of their new Action Plan 2023-26.


#### Parent views

Our biennial Parent Satisfaction Survey collects feedback across the range of provision and services that we offer and forms a vital part of our quality assurance and improvement process. Alongside surveys of students and staff, as well as ad hoc consultation with other key stakeholders, the Parent Satisfaction Survey is part of our approach to strive to always do better. The results are considered by senior managers and reported to governing body committees, with an action plan agreed where there are areas to focus on.
